The season of "The Impossible Dream" and the one many claim was the birth of "Red Sox Nation." Under new manager Dick Williams, plucked from their Triple A ballclub, the Bosox posted their first winning campaign since 1958. They had lost 100 games as recently as 1965. The Summer of '67 was a dogfight between Boston, the White Sox, the Tigers, and Twins. It came down to the very last day of the season when the Red Sox knocked off the Twins at Fenway Park, 5-3, to clinch the pennant. The Chisox lost their last five games to fall out of the race, finishing only three games out. The Tigers lost that last day to the Angels to end the year tied for second with Minnesota. The Bosox were a combined 26-28 versus their closest pursuers...The season was also highlighted by 27-year-old Carl Yastrzemski winning baseball's Triple Crown with 44 homers, 121 RBI, and .326 BA. What's more, his on-base percentage (.418), slugging percentage (.622), and OPS (1.040) were the best in the big leagues. Add an American League MVP Award to his '67 resume. Before an awful beating at Fenway Park, August 18th, Tony Conigliaro had blasted 20 home runs. He would be lost for the next 18 months. George Scott produced 19 jacks and 82 RBI. The Red Sox led the A. L. with a .255 BA and 158 home runs... Number One starter Jim Lonborg, 25, won the A. L.'s Cy Young Award with a major league high 22 wins and the league's most strikeouts (246). Pitchers Gary Bell, acquired from the Indians June 4th, and Jose Santiago figured prominently as well in the Red Sox's run to the post-season. Both won 12 games. The staff ERA was 3.36 (8th in the league)...The seven-game World Series versus the St. Louis Cardinals was decided after a 7-2 victory by the Redbirds on Boston's home turf. "Yaz" hit .400 and three homers during the Series; Lonborg won two ballgames. The Cardinals' Bob Gibson was the difference with three Series victories.
