There was a distinctly different air surrounding the Orioles and Memorial Stadium during the 1979 season. First, they drew 1.6 million fans to the ballpark following year-after-year of static attendance figures around one million. The Birds had remained very competitive in the AL East--and all of baseball--during the 1970s, but not the powerhouse, supremely talented O's of the three campaigns from 1969 through 1971, years they went to the World Series and beat a great Cincinnati Reds team in 1970...The '79 ballclub smacked 181 homers (3rd in the A. L.) and hit .261 (11th) at the plate. Most of all, they played intelligent baseball with solid and timely but not great hitting, stingy defense, and with, as Orioles' fans became accustomed, consistently terrific pitching. Cy Young Award winner Mike Flanagan won a major-league high 23 games and lost only nine. He led the Orioles' staff in strikeouts (190) and shutouts (5). He completed 16 games, right behind Dennis Martinez's 18. Martinez, affectionately called "El Presidente," won 15 ballgames. Scott McGregor added thirteen victories while Steve Stone pitched in with eleven. The pitching corps topped the American League in ERA (3.26) to go along with 52 complete games, second to Milwaukee's major-league high 61...Veteran Ken Singleton, 32, who finished second in league MVP votes, was the team leader with 35 homers, 111 RBI, and 93 runs scored. Twenty-three-year-old Eddie Murray played his first base position fundamentally among the best, but his real strength was at the plate where the switch-hitter slammed 25 home runs, drove home 99, and topped the team with 179 base hits. Gary Roenicke popped 25 jacks as well...The Birds knocked off a very good California Angels "nine" three-games-to-one in the ALCS, the pennant-clincher an 8-0 six hit whitewash of the Halos in Anaheim by McGregor...The National League champion Pittsburgh Pirates and their "We Are Family" fight song invaded Memorial Stadium for the World Series first two contests, a 1-1 split before the O's took a commanding lead of three-games-to-one in Pittsburgh. The Bucs won Game Five at Three Rivers Stadium, 7-1, before rallying to win the last two in Baltimore, 4-0, and 4-1. Pirates' batters hit .323 in the Series while the Orioles finished at .232. Light-hitting Kiko Garcia batted .400 with six RBI as well as two doubles and a triple; Singleton was 10-28 (.357) with a double and two runs batted in to the lead the O's offense.
