The Yankees and Red Sox (who else?) ended the season in a dead tie for first place of the AL East. To determine the division champ, the two teams played a Game 163 at Fenway Park, October 2nd. In one of the most talked about games in baseball annals, light-hitting "Bucky" Dent used whatever power he had to lift a three-run, two out homer over "The Green Monster" in the seventh off Red Sox pitcher Mike Torrez to clinch the flag for New York in an eventual 5-4 victory. As late as July 19th, the Yanks had trailed the Boston's by fourteen games in the standings. Billy Martin resigned as skipper in late July after he had had a loose mouth with the press about Reggie Jackson and Martin's boss, George Steinbrenner. Martin was fuming over Jackson screwing-up a bunt/hit away sign in the tenth inning of a game in Kansas City. He suspended Reggie for five games in the aftermath; but worse yet, Billy popped off to the media saying "one's a born liar (Jackson) and the other's convicted (Steinbrenner, who had made illegal political campaign contributions)." In the first half of the season, Steinbrenner was not pleased with the play of his ball club which placed a lot of pressure on Martin as well. Some believe Billy had really been fired for the "convicted" comment. When Martin was let go (or whatever), the Yankees were 52-42. Coach Dick Howser managed the team for one game before the much more reserved Bob Lemon was hired as the new field boss. The Yankees were reigned under Lemon; they would go 48-20 the rest of the way. New York sent home K. C. in four games of the ALCS and beat the Dodgers in the World Series for the second straight year in six games...Statistically, the Bronx Bombers were led by Jackson (27 homers, 97 RBI, 82 runs scored); Graig Nettles (27 home runs, 93 RBI); Chris Chambliss (171 base hits, 90 RBI); Willie Randolph (87 runs scored); and Thurman Munson (183 base hits). For the year, the Yanks hit .267 and 125 homers...The pitching staff led the A. L. in almost every category. Their league-best 3.18 ERA was headlined by A. L. Cy Young Award winner Ron Guidry (25-3 won/loss record, 248 strikeouts, 16 complete games, nine shutouts); Ed Figueroa (20-9, 12 complete games); and closer "Goose" Gossage with the league high in saves. Guidry also finished second in the voting for the league's Most Valuable Player.
