This 96th Edition of the Yankees has been added to the list of "Greatest Teams of All Time." It set A LOT of records, too. They compiled the MOST wins in a season--until it was surpassed by Seattle in 2001. The Yanks 114 wins remain the record by a team which won the World Series--their 24th title. New York was 11-2 in the post-season making their overall mark 125-50 in '98, also a new major league record. (They broke the mark set by the Mets in 1986.)...Individual awards went to Joe Torre (the Associated Press' Manager of the Year), Scott Brosius (World Series MVP), and Bernie Williams (A.L. Batting Champion). Derek Jeter led the league with 127 runs scored...Tino Martinez led the ball club with twenty-eight home runs and one hundred twenty-three runs batted in. Williams socked twenty-six homers while Paul O'Neill and Darryl Strawberry both clubbed twenty-four. Jeter was the high-man with 203 base hits. The Yankees finished second in the league in batting (.288) and fourth in home runs (207). They were the league leaders with 965 runs scored...The top five starters won a combined seventy-nine games: David Cone (20), David Wells (18), Andy Pettitte (16), Hideki Irabu (13), and Orlando Hernandez (12). Cone topped the staff with 209 strikeouts; Wells completed eight games including five shutouts. At Yankee Stadium May 17th, Wells pitched a no-hit, perfect game against Minnesota. It was the second in the team's history. (The other, of course, is Don Larsen's perfect in the '56 Fall Classic versus Brooklyn.) "Boomer" walked none and punched out eleven batters. The Yankee hurlers posted the league's best ERA (3.82) and the fewest runs allowed (656)...New York swept the San Diego Padres in the World Series...They finished the regular season twenty-two games ahead of second place Boston in the AL East from whom the Yanks won seven of twelve match-ups.
