The Jays led the American League in batting average (.279) and stolen bases (170); their 159 home runs placed them sixth in the league. Joe Carter turned on the Jays power with 33 homers and 121 RBI to lead the ball club. Here's the rest of this dynamite line-up: John Olerud (24 home runs, 107 RBI, 54 doubles, 200 base hits, 109 runs scored); Robbie Alomar (17 home runs, 192 base hits, 109 runs scored); Devon White (116 runs scored); and Paul Molitor (22 homers, 111 RBI, 211 base hits, 116 runs scored)... Pat Hentgen's 19-9 won/loss record was the best among the hurlers. He finished second to Juan Guzman (14 wins) in strikeouts, 194-122. Dave Stewart won twelve ball games and Todd Stottlemire was a winner of ten. Closer Duane Ward's save total led the league; he struck out 97 batters. The staff's ERA of 4.21 placed them fifth... At the All Star break, the Blue Jays had a half-game lead in the AL East with a 49-40 record. Ten days later, they moved into first place, alone or in a tie, for the remainder of the season. The Jays put as many as eight games between them and their closest challenger in the year's second half... Toronto started their run to back-to-back World Championships after eliminating the White Sox in the ALCS, 4-2. The series was tied at one point, 2-2... In the World Series, the Jays took a commanding three games to one lead over the Phillies--one of those games a 15-14 Toronto victory in Philly in Game Four. Entering the eighth inning the Blue Jays were down 14-9. They would score SIX runs in the top half of that inning on five hits, two walks, and Devon White's two-run triple to right centerfield to knock in the tying and go ahead runs off the Phils Mitch Williams. Duane Ward pitched the final inning-and-a-third for a save. In Game Six, Williams would again come in to face the Jays with Toronto down 6-5. Williams walked Rickey Henderson to start the bottom of the ninth, got Devon White to fly out, and then allowed a single to Paul Molitor. Joe Carter followed Molitor in the batting order and with two strikes, hit the famous (for Jays fans) three-run walk-off home run to leftfield for an 8-6 victory. It was only the second time a walk-off homer had won a World Series. (The other, the Pirates Bill Mazeroski to beat the Yankees in the 1960 Fall Classic.) The two combatants scored a combined total of 81 runs in the Series.
