After April 13th, "The Fish" were a second place team behind Atlanta in the NL East who won the division by nine games. The Marlins WON the regular season series, 8-4...Moises Alou's 23 home runs and 115 RBI led the ballclub. Gary Sheffield added 21 jacks and 71 RBI; Bobby Bonilla (17 HR) drove home 96 runs. Twenty-year-old Edgar Renteria posted the most base hits (171) and runs scored (90). As a team, Florida hit .259 and 136 homers...Kevin Brown (16 wins) led the pitching staff with 205 strikeouts and six complete games. Alex Fernandez was a 17-game winner and rang up 183 K's. Al Leiter won eleven. The staff ERA was 3.83...With the NL Wild Card in their pocket, the Marlins swept the Giants, 3-0, in the NLDS and upset the Braves in the NLCS, 4-2. In the Fall Classic, Cleveland and Florida split the first two games, but the Marlins came on strong to capture three of the last five to raise aloft the World Championship trophy in seven games. The final, played in Miami, was an 11-inning nail-biter won in the bottom of the inning when Craig Counsell scored on Renteria's single with two out and the bases loaded. Florida became the first Wild Card team to win a World Series and achieve the honor of an expansion team reaching its first Series in the fewest years as a franchise (five).
