After opening a new season 11-9 by the end of April, the defending World Champions would move into sole possession of first place in the NL East on July 3rd and remain there the rest of the year. They would assume an 8 ½ game lead in the division on September 3rd and clinch the title September 30th for their third straight playoff appearance--the first time since the '76 through '78 campaigns. The Phils won 16 of 20 games late May into early June and racked up a 20-7 record for the month of July. In their NLDS match-up with Colorado, the Phillies would win, 3-1, and eliminate the Dodgers in the NLCS for the second straight year, 4-1. In the World Series, the Yankees quickly took a 3-1 lead in games and went on to knock off the Phils in six games for New York's 27th Series triumph...As a team, the ball club hit .258 and led the N. L. with 224 home runs. In the prime of his career, Ryan Howard blasted 45 homers to lead the team while leading the major leagues in RBI (141). Three others popped at LEAST thirty-one home runs: Jayson Werth (36), Raul Ibanez (34), and Chase Utley (31). Shane Victorino led the Phils in base hits (181); Utley was tops in runs scored (112)...The acquisition of Cliff Lee at the end of July was a huge boost to the pitching staff. He won his first five games in Phillie pinstripes and would win seven in all. Joe Blanton, J. A. Happ, and Jamie Moyer each won twelve ball games. Cole Hamels (10 wins) posted the most strikeouts (168)...Beloved Phillies broadcaster, Harry Kalas, suffered a fatal heart attack in the broadcast booth prior to a game in Washington in early April. "Harry the K" had been announcing the team's games since 1971. He had "High Hopes."
