After a new divisional set up for '69, the Cubbies sprinted out into the lead of the NL East by going 75-44 by August 16<sup>th</sup>. The ball club led the division for 155 days before an 8-17 collapse to end the season. When the Cubs played a two-game series in New York against the Mets in September, Cubs' fans say it was an omen of bad luck when somehow a black cat had access to the ball park and walked behind captain Ron Santo in the on-deck circle. Some fans believed that errors by outfielder Don Young in the same game cost the Cubs first place. Santo later denied accusations made at him that HE blamed Young for the team's nose dive. (Ernie Banks admitted that Santo had gone nuts in the dugout after the game which opened a sore rift in the clubhouse.) The Mets would go on a streak of winning twenty-three of their last thirty games to win the division. The Cubs would end the year second, eight games behind. Some said Durocher was to blame because he didn't want to platoon and rest regulars with all the day games the Cubs played...Santo led the Cubs with 29 homers and 123 RBI. Elder statesman Ernie Banks was next with 23 dingers and 106 RBI. Billy Williams posted a "triple double" with 33 doubles, 10 triples, and 21 home runs. The Cubs hit .253 and were second in the N.L. with 142 homers...Fergie Jenkins anchored the pitching staff going 21-15, striking out 273 batters, and completing 23 games. He had seven shutouts. Bill Hands was 20-14 with 18 complete games and 181 K's while lefty Ken Holtzman won seventeen and struck out 176 opponents. Closer Phil Regan finished 49 contests. The staff ERA was fifth in the league at 3.34.
