Bobby Cox's Braves started the season winning their first seven games and held the NL East lead by two games at the end of April. Atlanta would be tied or alone in first place from Opening Day almost right up until the All Star break. A 6-1 loss to the Cardinals at home, July 10<sup>th</sup>, the last game before the break, dropped them to second only a game behind Montreal. (The Expos had won 8-2 at San Diego to take over the lead.) During the season's first 3 ½ months, the top five starters— Greg Maddux, Tom Glavine, John Smoltz, Steve Avery, and Kent Mercker—were a combined 43-26; closer Greg McMichael saved 17 ballgames. Atlanta moved back into the lead (or tied for four days) from July 15<sup>th</sup> through the 21<sup>st</sup>. The ballclub slid to second for good after losing the first game of a doubleheader at St. Louis, July 22<sup>nd</sup>. Their biggest lead had been five games in mid-April, their largest deficit seven games the day before a players' strike ended the season and canceled the World Series. The Braves record after the All Star break was 16-13 compared to the Expos scintillating 20-7 (.741), resulting in Montreal's lead in the division to be six games when the campaign dishearteningly closed down...Some pundits strongly felt the Braves season would implode after "Neon Deion" Sanders was exchanged with the Reds, May 29<sup>th</sup>, for outfielder Roberto Kelly and a minor-leaguer. Sanders had hit four homers and driven in 21 at the time of the trade. Kelly, meanwhile, socked six home runs, drove in 24, played a solid centerfield, and nearly matched Sanders's stats. Atlanta finished seventh in the league in hitting (.267); their 137 homers placed them first. Playing in 113 of the Braves 114 games, Fred McGriff put up huge numbers: 34 jacks and 94 RBI. He led the team with 135 base hits, 25 doubles, and 81 runs scored. David Justice slugged 19 homers while Ryan Klesko added 17 and Javy Lopez 13...The pitching corps was the N. L. leader with 865 strikeouts in a total of 1,026.3 innings pitched. Ace Greg Maddux finished the season with a 16-6 W/L record (N. L. best) and led the majors in ERA, innings pitched, complete games (10), and WHIP (0.896). He also led the staff with 156 strikeouts and allowed only 31 walks. With that, he was selected for the league's Cy Young Award. Glavine was next with 13 wins and 140 K's. The three other starters: Smoltz, Avery, and Mercker won 6, 8, and 9 games, respectively. The staff allowed the fewest home runs (76), hits (929), and runs allowed (448) in the big leagues.
