The American League West Division was owned by the Angels for practically the entire Spring/Summer/Fall of 2005. The All Star break showed the Halos with a five-game cushion and a record of 52-36. The pesky Oakland A's remained close behind during August and September (the A's actually had a two-game lead over Los Angeles on August 30th); however, the Angels rallied for a 21-9 September while the A's stumbled through the month at 13-17, ensuring a final margin of seven games for the AL West champions over Oakland...Vladimir Guerrero, who carried a big stick, finished the season eighth in the majors in batting average. He was the team leader with 32 home runs and 108 RBI. The mercurial Chone Figgins, who played positions all over the diamond, pilfered the most bases in the big leagues (62 at a 78 percent success rate), and led the Angels with 186 base hits and 113 runs scored while playing in 158 games. Garret Anderson, completing his twelfth season in an Angels uniform, was second to Guerrero in homers (17) and RBI (96). As a team, the Angels hit .270 and 147 home runs...L. A.'s pitching staff was the strength of the team. Their 3.68 ERA was third-best in the league. They led the A. L. with 1,126 strikeouts and 54 saves, led by Frankie Rodriguez's 45. Bartolo Colon (A. L. Cy Young Award) finished second in the majors with 21 victories; John Lackey won 14 and topped the staff in strikeouts (199)...The Angels eliminated the Yankees 3-2 in the ALDS (the clincher a 5-3 victory in Anaheim) before being toppled from the post-season, four games to one, by the White Sox in the ALCS. Angels bats were held to a .175 batting average while the eventual World Champion White Sox hit at a .248 clip.
