Looking for a good example of a ".500" ballclub? You've found one right here. For practically the entire season, the Brewers hung around the .500-mark: at the most, three games OVER on April 8th; at the worst, eight games UNDER on June 21st. At the All Star break, the "Brew Crew" was fourth in the NL Central, fourteen games out with a 42-46 record...The team socked 175 homers, led by Carlos Lee's 32. He collected the most RBI as well (114) after playing in all 162 games. Geoff Jenkins slugged 25 jacks while Brady Clark topped the ballclub with 183 base hits and 94 runs scored. As a team, the Brewers hit .259...The pitching staff finished fifth in the league in ERA (3.97) and racked-up the second-most strikeouts (1,173). Leading the mound corps in wins was lefty Chris Capuano (18) followed by Doug Davis's eleven and Ben Sheets' ten. Davis was at the top of the staff with 208 K's; Capuano was next with 176...Twenty-one-year-old Prince Fielder, the son of former slugger Cecil, introduced HIS powerful bat to the big leagues for the first time, June 13th, going zero for four versus Tampa Bay. In 39 games, Fielder popped two homers and knocked in ten. The younger Fielder, likewise, had the distinction of being the 16,295th player to debut in a major league game; pop was #12,664 in 1985, also at the age of 21 when his son was just a year old.
