The ballclub calling Chicago's South Side home rocked the baseball world after winning their first World Championship since 1917. They completed the post-season with a superlative 11-1 record, including a four-games-to-none sweep of the then National League Houston Astros in the Fall Classic...Manager Ozzie Guillen began laying the groundwork of this team starting in 2004, his first year as skipper. During the winter of '04-'05, he and General Manager Ken Williams took the White Sox to the next level with key acquisitions such as Jermaine Dye, closer Dustin Hermanson, starter Orlando Hernandez, infielder Tad Taguchi, and perhaps the most valuable of all, feisty catcher A. J. Pierzynski from the Giants to make more noise in a sleepy clubhouse and take charge of the pitching staff. It all worked. Dye went on to slam 31 home runs and drive in 86. Hermanson was superb out of the bullpen with 34 saves. Hernandez was a 9-game winner; Taguchi popped 15 homers and drove in 71 while Pierzynski provided the needed leadership and ended the year with a .999 fielding percentage (one error in 128 games). Paul Konerko swung the most potent bat: 40 jacks, 100 RBI, 163 base hits, and 98 runs scored. The White Sox had the fourth most homers in the A. L. (200) and wound up 11th with a .262 team BA...Four starters won a total of 63 ballgames: Jon Garland (18), Mark Buehrle (16), Jose Contreras (15), and Freddy Garcia (14). The pitching staff's 3.61 ERA tied them with Cleveland for the league's best average...Chicago ran-up three eight-game winning streaks during the season: one starting in mid-April, one the first week of May, and the other in mid-June. Their largest lead was 15 games reached on August 1st.
