The American League West during the '79 season was a fight in close quarters between the Angels, Twins, Royals, and Rangers. The Halos completed the months of April and May with the lead by the slimmest of margins. They remained in first at the All Star break with a two-game advantage and 55-38 record. For the rest of the year the Angels held off their determined pursuers and attained their biggest lead at five games on September 25th. In the season's second half they played ball just under .500 (33-36). Versus the previously named ballclubs their record was 21-18...The Angels finished the regular season with the A. L.'s second-best team BA (.282), fourth with 164 home runs, and the most base hits (866). The power began with thirty-year-old Don Baylor, the American League MVP, and his team-high 36 jacks. He led the major leagues with 139 RBI and 120 runs scored. Baylor compiled those off-the-chart numbers by playing in all 162 games. Bobby Grich, despite his aching back, may have put up the best stats of his career with 30 homers; he tied Dan Ford's 101 RBI. Ford and DH Willie Mays Aikens both popped 21 home runs...The pitching staff featured two 16-game winners: Dave Frost and Nolan Ryan. Ryan's 223 K's, 17 complete games, and five shutouts topped the mound corps. He allowed 114 walks. The staff ERA (4.34) left them ninth in the league...California won Game Three of the ALCS against Baltimore after dropping the first two at Memorial Stadium. The Angels scored two runs in the last of the ninth of that third game in Anaheim to remain alive with a 4-3 victory. Game Four (and the best-of-five series) went to the Orioles, 8-0, as the Angels could manage only six scattered hits off Scott McGregor. Baltimore banged out twelve hits against four California pitchers. Mike Barlow spun a perfect ninth. Rod Carew hit .412 in the series; Ford hit two homers and drove home four.
