After a near-miss to qualify for post-season play in 1978 (second place, one game in back of the Yankees), the Bosox won at least ninety games for the fourth time in five seasons, but finished '79 third, 11 ½ games in back of Baltimore. In their season series versus both the Yanks and Orioles, the Bostons were 5-8. Against second place Milwaukee in the AL East, the Red Sox were 8-4...They topped the big leagues in team batting average (.283), home runs (194), and doubles (310). Jim Rice (39 doubles) and Fred Lynn (42 doubles) both hit 39 jacks. Rice led the team with 130 RBI while Lynn was right behind with 122. "Butch" Hobson added 28 homers and drove home 93 runs. "Dewey" Evans and Carl Yastrzemski both popped 21 dingers; "Yaz" produced 87 RBI at age thirty-nine...On the pitching rubber, Dennis Eckersley garnered the most wins (17) and strikeouts (150). (He had won 20 in '78.) Mike Torrez (125 K's) won sixteen ballgames for the second straight year. Big Bob Stanley (15-2 wins/losses in '78) also won sixteen. The staff was fourth in the A. L. in ERA (4.03)...Lynn ended the season atop the league in batting average and led the majors in on-base percentage (.423), slugging percentage (.637), and OPS (1.059). Yastrzemski became the first American Leaguer and 15<sup>th</sup> in major league history to reach 3,000 career hits and 400 home runs. Hit #3,000 came off the Yankees Jim Beattie, September 12<sup>th</sup>, at Fenway Park. Rice's 369 total bases beat George Brett by six to pace the big leagues.
