The Phillies finished their fifth straight season with a winning record under skipper Gene Mauch, "The Little General." The ballclub also concluded the campaign among the National League's best in several categories: team BA (.258, 4th); team OPS (.700, 4th); home runs (117, 6th); stolen bases (42, 2nd); and ERA (3.57, 5th). Mauch's pitching staff was the league leader with 52 complete games. After the month of May, the closest the ballclub would come to first place was June 8th when they were 30-21 and in third place only 1 ½ games out of first. The Phils would settle into fourth in the standings for the remainder of the year on July 31st...Twenty-four-year-old Dick Allen was the team leader with 40 home runs, 10 triples, 112 runs scored, and 110 RBI. His .632 slugging percentage and 1.027 OPS were the league's best batting figures. His season as one of the game's premier sluggers resulted in a fourth-place finish in N. L. MVP voting. Slick-fielding first baseman Bill White, 32, followed Allen with 22 jacks and 103 RBI. The highly reliable Johnny Callison collected the most doubles in the big leagues (40) and was second to Allen on the team after scoring 93 runs. He topped the ballclub with 169 base hits...All Star Jim Bunning, 34, tied Jim Kaat and Sandy Koufax for the most starts in the majors (41) and equaled eight other hurlers for the most shutouts (5). The future Congressman's 19-14 W/L record was second to lefty Chris Short's 20-14. Short led the staff with 19 complete games. Bunning finished runner-up in MLB to Koufax with 252 strikeouts compared to the Dodger ace's 317.
