After playing their first two years in the shabby, old Polo Grounds, the Mets moved into their new palace, originally and briefly called Flushing Meadows Stadium. It was soon renamed Shea Stadium to respectively honor the man responsible for bringing National League baseball back to Gotham, William A. Shea. The new ballpark opened on April 17th, with the Pirates spoiling the proceedings, a 4-3 victory for the visitors with just over 50,000 in attendance. Shea Stadium was a busy place that Summer with the Worlds Fair drawing thousands nearby. It hosted the All Star Game, won by the N. L., 7-4. The Father's Day crowd in June witnessed the Phillies' Jim Bunning pitch a perfect, no-hit game, the first in the senior circuit since 1880. In addition, the first Japanese-born ballplayer, pitcher Masanori Murakami, appeared in a major league game for the San Francisco Giants...A loss to the Cardinals in St. Louis, April 28th, plopped the Mets into the cellar for the rest of the season. The longest losing streak for the loveable Metropolitans was a surprising eight games, once in June and again in September...Charley Smith was the team leader with 20 home runs while Joe Christopher hit 16 jacks and tallied the most RBI (76). Nineteen-year-old native son Ed Kranepool, a popular and early "face of the franchise," contributed 10 dingers...Al Jackson had the most victories (11) on the pitching staff. Two other starters, Jack Fisher and Tracy Stallard, both won 10 ballgames...Over 1.7 million fans clicked the turnstiles to see baseball at Shea, second in the league.
