One thing about the Pirates of old (the 60s, 70s, early 90s) was that they could hit. The '64 ballclub's team average was third in the N. L. (.264) and tops with 54 triples. "The Great One," Roberto Clemente, had the highest batting average in the majors while he was second in base hits (211), second in singles (152), fourth in doubles (40), and seventh in OBP (.388). He also claimed his fourth Gold Glove, hit 12 homers and drove in 87. Twenty-four-year old Willie Stargell launched 21 homers to lead the team; he was second to Clemente with 78 RBI...Big lefty Bob Veale struck out the most batters in the majors (250), but he also gave up the most walks (124). Veale won 18 ballgames and completed 14. Bob Friend and Vern Law, both in their mid-thirties, won 13 and 12 games, respectively. A pitcher who became one of the most beloved Pirates in franchise history, Steve Blass, made his big league debut May 10<sup>th</sup>, pitching five innings against the Braves after replacing starter Tommie Sisk in the first inning of the second game of a doubleheader at Forbes Field. He struck out two and walked two. Al McBean was the pitcher of record, picking up the W after the Buccos scored three runs in the bottom of the ninth to win the game, 6-5...The Pirates were competitive in the first half of the year (fourth place, eight games out), but fell from the race with a 38-43 mark in the second half. At their best, they were 10 games over .500 (third, 7 ½ games behind), August 16<sup>th</sup>, after splitting a doubleheader with the Cubs in Chicago.
