The season's high-point for The Tribe came at the end of an 11-game winning streak, May 23<sup>rd</sup> through June 4<sup>th</sup>, placing the team five games out of the AL East lead, three games over .500 (26-23). For most of the year, the Indians were stuck in the lower half of the division standings. Despite the same record as Toronto, Cleveland finished technically ahead of the Blue Jays because the Indians won their season series, 7-6. Versus the rest of the division, The Tribe was 31-34...When outside their teepee, 6' 5" Len Barker proved the best on the pitching staff with 15 wins, 187 strikeouts and 10 complete games. Rick Sutcliffe was solid all season as well: 14 victories with 142 K's. He posted the lowest ERA in the American League, seventh in the majors. A healthy Bert Blyleven is one of the best pitchers in the game, a prime cog on any staff; however, he was only able to make four starts while nursing a sore elbow the entire year...As a team, the Indians hit 109 home runs and hit .262, the latter eighth in the league. Toby Harrah played in his fourth All Star Game and led the ballclub in doubles (29) and base hits (183). He drove in 78 runs and finished fourth in the big leagues with a .398 on-base percentage. He played all 162 games. Andre Thornton's 32 jacks and 116 RBI were tops on the ballclub. He ended the year third in the majors in RBI in addition to walks (109). AKA "The Human Rain Delay," but very competent with the stick, Mike Hargrove was fifth in The Show with 101 bases on balls. Fan fave "Super Joe" Charboneau, 26 years old, played his last big league game, June 1<sup>st</sup>, going zero for three against the Twins. Multiple back surgeries had stolen his promising career. In 22 games, he hit two homers (9 RBI) before being dispatched to the minors.
