The Dodgers year after year shine the brightest in Hollywood (not including the movie stars). The shiniest of all, Shohei Ohtani, might give King Kong a run for his money. The five-time All Star, Rookie of the Year, four-time NL MVP, member of two World Series Champions, reigned supreme once again as the best baseball has to offer, right out of central casting. Here's his 2025: 55 homers (3rd in the majors), a N. L. leading .622 slugging percentage and 1.014 OPS. Both trailed the Yankees Aaron Judge for big league highs; his .392 on base percentage was fourth. He drove home 102 and scored 146 runs. The ball club hit 244 homers, including nine others to join Ohtani, with ten or more...The Dodgers ran neck-and-neck with the Padres all season long for the top spot of the NL West. They snatched the title from San Diego, winning nine of thirteen games. The two did not meet face-to-face in September. L. A.'s biggest lead was nine games, July 3rd. In the post-season, the Dodgers ripped through the Reds, Phillies, and Brewers, winning nine of ten games. The Fall Classic will always be known as a true blue confrontation. The Toronto Blue Jays routed the Dodgers in Game One. L. A. grabbed the lead in the Series, 2-1, winning an 18-inning marathon at Dodger Stadium. The finale, a Game Seven 5-4 Dodger victory in 11 innings, decided the Series. Its MVP, Yoshinobu Yamamoto, won three games, including a complete game 5-1 victory in Game 2...For the first time since 2005, not one no-hitter was accomplished in the big leagues. Yamamoto came the closest, giving up a home run to the Orioles Jackson Holliday, September 6th, with two out in the ninth. The Dodgers bullpen eventually lost the game, 4-3, in Baltimore.
