When new manager Clayton McCullough gazed into the fish tank (if there is one) in his new headquarters, one would think he saw a lot talent swimming around in there. Indeed he did. The seemingly inter-changeable Xavier Edwards and Otto Lopez at second base and shortstop play nearly everyday and provide lots of speed and solid defense up-the-middle. Edwards can hit for average and steal a bushel of bases, Lopez can hit the long ball: 15 homers, team high 77 RBI. Kyle Stowers fits right in: 25 home runs, 73 RBI. Plays a doggone good leftfield, too. New catcher Agustin Ramirez may wind up playing another position because of his potent bat (21 homers, 67 RBI) and above average speed. Javier Sanoja was a wonderful surprise (6 HRs, 38 RBI), but the kid brings Gold Glove defense wherever he plays in the field. That's just the beginning. Check out Liam Hicks, Jakob Marsee, and Jeff Conine's son, Griffin. They all range from 22-27 years of age...Starter Sandy Alcantara returned from a missed 2024 campaign to win 11 games. He wasn't quite what we're used to seeing from the six five powerhouse on the mound, but with time, he'll be his old dominating self. The rest of the staff is composed of experienced veterans and youngsters on the rise...McCullough rallied his team to 17 more wins than the year prior. The Marlins bounced between fourth and last the early part of the year; but in the second half, the Miami squad played well enough to call third place their own from July 3rd to the end of the season. They finished only four games from a Wild Card spot and with more wins on the road than at home (41-38). Two winning streaks--one eight straight, the other seven--gave a glimpse of what may be in the offing.
